

# TO GENERAL GREENE

A Statue to Be Erected at Guilford Battle Ground.

BY THE UNITED STATES

The Bill Favorably Reported in the Senate.

AN APPROPRIATION OF \$25,000

The Senate Spent the Day on the Agricultural Appropriation Bill and Passed It Without Material Amendment.

Washington, March 3.—The Senate gave most of the day to the Agricultural Appropriation bill and passed that measure carrying \$3,262,000 without material amendment.

Another bill passed during the day changes the limitations of fourth-class mail matter so as to free the postal service from bulky articles heretofore sent free by the government departments. Mr. Wolcott, in urging the bill, said roller-top desks and electric motors were among the articles sent as mail by the departments.

Later in the day word came from the House that the error concerning the Cuban resolutions had been corrected. In its corrected form the House resolution is an amendment to that passed by the Senate. As thus reported back the subject was referred to the committee on Foreign Relations, Mr. Sherman stating that the committee would consider the question at the meeting to-morrow.

Mr. Allen presented and asked immediate consideration of a resolution declaring that all United States bonds be redeemable in both gold and silver, but objection was made and the resolution went over.

Mr. Chandler, of the committee on Privileges and Elections, presented the majority report of that committee providing for an investigation of the Alabama elections by a select committee. Mr. Gray, of the same committee, gave notice of a minority report.

Mr. Gorman gave notice of a motion to reconsider the bill passed by the Senate yesterday providing for additional enlistments in the navy in case of emergency.

The bill for a statue to General Nathaniel Greene at Guilford Court House, N. C., commemorating the battle of March 15, 1781, was reported favorably from the Library committee.

The bill carries an appropriation of \$25,000 and was introduced by Senator Pritchard (Rep., North Carolina.) Mr. Settle has charge of the bill in the House and expects an early report from the committee.
