

Monument for Guilford Battle-Field. Baltimore Sun.
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The committee appointed by the Maryland Historical Society to erect a monument on Guilford battle-field, in North Carolina, in memory of the soldiers of the Maryland Line who died there in 1781, are receiving a number of subscriptions. The committee wants to begin work on the monument on the anniversary of the battle, March 15, of this year. The cost is not to exceed \$350, and it is to mark the position of the Maryland regiment. It is to be a granite boulder, upon which in bronze will be the coat of arms of Maryland and an inscription to this effect: "Maryland's tribute to her dead heroes. Erected by members of the Maryland Historical Society in memory of the soldiers of the Maryland Line. 1781-1892. Non omnis moriar." The committee, Messrs. Edward G. Daves, Bradley T. Johnson and W. Hall Harris, say: "The time has come when Maryland should pay some worthy tribute to the heroes who made her name illustrious in distant States. On our own soil it is easy to keep in mind the deeds of our ancestors, but other States should be taught to honor the men who fought for American liberty from Long Island to the Savannah river. The First Maryland was the finest regiment in that army of Gen. Greene which saved the Carolinas and paved the way for the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown. It had served under Washington in his New Jersey campaigns, and when transferred to the South had gloriously routed Tarleton's veterans at Cowpens. At Guilford it again distinguished itself. Of its Lieutenant-Colonel (Howard) Gen. Greene said: 'He deserves a statue of gold, and its Major (Anderson) fell on the field, where his body has mouldered into dust in a forgotten grave.'"
