

REARED TO HEROES OF THE LOST CAUSE

Unveiling of the Monument
at High Point.

IMPOSING CEREMONIES

ERECTED BY THE JUNIOR OR-
DER OF MECHANICS.

PRESENTED BY PROFESSOR CROWELL

Speeches by Hons. F. C. Robbins and Julian
S. Carr. The Opera House in Which
the Services Were Held Taxed
Beyond its Capacity.

High Point, N. C., July 4.—(Special.)—
The handsome monument to the Con-
federate dead erected through the ef-
forts of the Junior Order of American
Mechanics, was unveiled here to-day
with imposing ceremonies. Owing to the
rain the exercises were held in the Opera
House, which was taxed to its utmost
capacity, and hundreds could not be ac-
commodated.

The monument was presented by Prof.
George H. Crowell. The dedication
speech was delivered by Hon. F. C.
Robbins, of Lexington. Col. Julian S.
Carr delivered an address on the Confed-
erate soldiers. At the conclusion of his
address, when he referred to the laboring
classes, he scored the "trusts" unmerci-
fully.

The speaking was all good. At the
conclusion there was a banquet, there be-
ing over eight hundred people at the
table at one time.

Although the rain interfered some-
what, the town was full of visitors.
Mr. Burnett, of Charleston, whose broth-
er is among the Confederate dead here,
was a visitor, and brought a beautiful
floral tribute from the Daughters of the
Confederacy of Charleston.
