May Tenth on the occasion of the unveiling there of the monument to the Confederate dead will attract general attention throughout the State and especially in Eastern North Carolina, so largely settled by the sturdy Scotch whose capital, as it were, is the thrifty, progressive and growing city of Lumberton.

Robeson county sent to the Confederacy numbers of her best men who as soldiers on the battle fields of the Civil War were true to the traditions of steadfastness and courage that for ages have made the Scotchman in battle the mainstay of patriotism and the dread of his enemies. in fittingly perpetuating the memory of her heroes of the sixties, Robeson county and Lumberton are speaking in the terms of that faith and courage which is part of their ancestry and which make the monument so appropriate as example and attestation.

A great crowd will gather to hear the address of Governor Glenn who will speak to a people who have proved his tried friends, and who will doubtless gain from the occasion the "liberty" in speech to excel himself.
